Longtime CTA staff Dawn Basurto is CSO's newest member

A short-term assignment with Oakland Education Association (OEA) has blossomed into more than two decades of service for Dawn Basurto as a dedicated member of CTA staff. Earlier this year, Basurto accepted a position in the Ontario RRC as a Uniserv representative, becoming the newest member of CSO.

How did you come to CTA and CSO?

In my experience, I have had the opportunity to learn about many different areas of CTA. My start in union work began at OEA. and what started as a short-term assignment turned into six years. A mentor encouraged me to continue at the Concord RRC as a Regional Resource Secretary and there I became involved with my staff union (CAS at the time).

Later, I moved to the Governmental Relations Department where I have been ever since, spending time in both the legislative and political units. In my previous staff union, I've had responsibilities as the secretary, area director, then president for several years. During this time, I also participated in the Harvard Trade Union Program and am currently the Secretary of the National Staff Organization (NSO), getting to learn about what's going on all over the country.

These experiences have deepened my passion to share my knowledge and give back doing this work. Everything is a learning lesson to prepare you for next thing. Over time, I've been grateful to have experienced many layers of CTA and feel that's given me a unique perspective to now contribute to CSO.



What do you love about advocating for educators?

That they know there's someone there for them, that will help them stand up for their rights and uphold the contract. I love it when I can help someone else to find their voice, to not be afraid to speak up and empower them to do for themselves.

What are you most proud of?

I'm feeling grateful for the opportunity to serve CTA members. It's important to me to do my best for them. CTA is a big world – I've worked with several departments and offices and with members in GR for 20-some years. I'm passionate about how ready I am to give back to educators.

Is there a quote or saying that you live your life by?

My youngest daughter, who was in college during the pandemic, made an Inspiration Board with affirmations – "You got this," "Be confident," "Let your light shine," to get through the harder times. She inspired me to surround myself with positive reminders – "Not every day's a bad day," "Brush it off" ... just giving yourself that extra boost and surrounding yourself with positive energy is important.

The CTA/CSO Family is mourning the loss of three dedicated union activists who passed since the last State Council meeting: CTA Board Member Jerry Eaton, Legislative Relations Specialist Jess Lima and former UniServ Staff Doug Appel. We asked CSO members to share their thoughts to help honor them. May their memories forever be a blessing.

Jerry Eaton

"Jerry always brought a great energy to the work, whether we were visiting prospective members at the California Virtual Academy in San Jose, or going classroom to classroom in Eureka, Crescent City or San Francisco. We visited hundreds of classrooms together. He listened and paid attention and made you feel like you mattered. At my school sites, he got a lot



of teachers who didn't have a strong connection with the union to talk to us. He was passionate about the union. Once, he heard a non-member talking bad about the union and it made him really mad. But he kept his cool. He didn't let it get to him. When we heard of Jerry's passing, a lot of local teacher leaders reached out to me to express their sadness: Leaders he visited and helped when he was up here. He made them feel like they weren't alone in the work. We had many talks over the years about our families, contract negotiations, politics & religion. I will miss him." *Lathe Gill*

"I'll always remember Jerry telling me how sorry he was about a difficult situation I was dealing with, and he felt badly that I had to continue to handle it. It was very kind, and he didn't have to take the time to tell me that." *Michelle Washington*

"Jess was a wonderful and caring human being, so easy to talk to even if you just needed someone to listen. Jess always had a smile on his face when you saw him. He always supported and encouraged me, even when I didn't have confidence in myself.

"Jerry and I became friends when he was a teacher and then local leader for Travis EA. He was always willing to listen, learn and be an advocate for someone. In those early years from local leader, working on release time for campaigns and eventually getting him to run for Vacaville school Board, Jerry realized there was a voice for him in CTA governance. That's the outside stuff. Really though, we were friends who bonded over cars, shared meals and talked about family and life. When I got my red Mustang, he went and got the blue one. Whenever he had questions about car culture, he'd call me up and check in. He loved talking about his family in New Zealand and adventures that awaited when he would retire. He would just call and check in on me and Jenn just to say hi. In fact, I was texting him at State Council and recently missed a call that went to voicemail just a few days before his passing. Though his body was giving out on him in the later years, he still had that laugh – that's what I'll remember.
